

Festival Cinema Invisible is an independent, not for profit venue dedicated to celebration of film, music and art of the Middle East that international audience may not otherwise see. FCI is committed to nurturing purposeful communication and meaningful cultural exchange. By introducing filmmakers and artists who may not have access to other mediums, the Festival provides a forum for dialogue and exchange of ideas. FCI offers filmmakers, musicians, and artists the opportunity to learn and grow by exhibiting their creative works, while encouraging the international public to expand their understanding and knowledge of the art and cinema of the region they may not be familiar with. FCI, aspiring to entertain and move the audience, features documentaries, independent, narratives, animations, experimental, short and full length films as well as music and the arts.



I moved back home to Redding two years ago with my husband and young family after spending twenty years away, which included college, graduate school, an early career in the CIA, consulting for the State Department in Washington, D.C., teaching at my undergraduate alma mater in the Midwest, and starting a non-profit organization called The Euphrates Institute.

Euphrates' mission is to "turn the 'Other' into a brother," a purpose which unfolded after an intense personal transformation I experienced in Iraq from 2003-2005. I went from seeing Iraqis as "the enemy" as a counterinsurgency analyst embedded with our Marines in al Anbar province, to seeing them as friends-working together to re-build their government after the collapse of Saddam's regime, and forging close, lasting relationships with the country's top leadership.

How I got from 'Other' to brother was sparked by a single moment along the Euphrates River when I found myself reflecting on its peace and tranquility, and realized that it flowed steadily through the battlefield of Fallujah—an unstoppable force no bombs or mortars could impede. The question was clear to me in that moment: Do I choose the path of life and peace, or the path of death and devastation?

I chose the river; and from that moment, I stopped fighting Iraqis and began to work with them.

This question of 'Other' applies to each one of us, wherever we are. In the wake of a divisive election and incidents of racism and intolerance around the country, and right here at home, it's a critical question for all of us to consider how we can turn 'Others' into brothers.

Festival Cinema Invisible is one of those avenues to help us do this: to help us see more clearly, understand more deeply, the invisible 'Other'—whether it's people from the Middle East, women, children, minority communities, who are so often marginalized and silenced. In opening our eyes and hearts, we gain more compassion and practice with turning the 'Other' into our brother.

One of the programs that Euphrates runs is a worldwide network of Chapters that are learning about and engaging with the 'Other' in their local communities. In less than two years, our Redding Chapter has already accomplished amazing things, including hosting renowned speakers, organizing interfaith and International Day of Peace activities, hosting forums for Muslim exchange students to share their views, encouraging Congressmen to increase numbers of Syrian refugees in the U.S., etc. We aim to be a growing presence for our community, a source of light and inspiration, and to help folks reach out to their 'Other', whether that is the homeless, people of different races, ethnicities, or religions, or even a differing political party.

Thank you for partnering with us locally to bring the changes we wish to see in the world. Indeed, similar to the Euphrates, our own Sacramento River flows peacefully and steadily through the heart of our town, and reminds us we can always choose its way.

It is certain that such ambition cannot be realized without your assistance and collaboration. To that end, we are thankful to the Euphrates Institute's support in providing the opportunity to reach you, our audience. We are also grateful to you for your enthusiasm and encouragement in fostering this much needed artistic dialogue. We hope that with your help FCI will grow to become a major platform for the artistic and intellectual exchange.







Fateme Ahmadi (One Thousand and one Teardrops) was born and raised in Shiraz, Iran and was awarded first prize in the Literature Olympiads, a nationwide humanities competition, granting her permission to complete two undergraduate courses simultaneously. Fateme completed degrees in Persian Literature and Filmmaking at Tehran University and The Art University of Tehran, respectively. In 2009, she completed the MA General Linguistics course at the Institute of Humanities and Cultural Studies in Tehran before becoming the first individual awarded a scholarship from Magic of Persia to attend the two-year MA Filmmaking program at The London Film School. During the course, Fateme wrote, edited, and directed more than ten short films, including four documentaries for BBC World. Fateme is now working toward her feature film, set in both London and Tehran.

She is currently in pre-production for two features documentaries to be shot in Afghanistan in 2017.

Suzannah Mirghani (Caravan) is a Communication and Media studies graduate and an independent filmmaker working on highlighting stories from the Gulf region, with a particular focus on Qatar. Being of multicultural background, she is interested in stories that examine the interconnectedness of multiple—and sometimes seemingly opposing—ethnicities and identities. She is especially interested in exploring the wealth of multicultural encounters that occur in a traditionally cosmopolitan place like Qatar.

Her most recent short film "Hind's Dream" premiered at the 2014 Abu Dhabi Film Festival, received an award for "artistic vision and poetic screenwriting" at the 2014 Ajyal Film Festival, and was selected for the short film corner at the 2015 Cannes Film Festival.



Mojtaba Mirtahmasb (Back Vocal) was born in 1971 in Kerman. Before returning to his native region, though, Mirtahmasb embarked on an extensive and meaningful journey through post-1979 Iran, moving from Tehran to Khuzestan, all the while documenting, the lived experiences of his people. From 1992 to 1995 he studied at the University of Art in Tehran. Mirtahmasb directed nine documentary-fiction films, each of which took as its main subject an element of Iranian Islamic culture. In 1997 he turned to an event emblazoned on the collective conscience of his people: the Iran-Iraq war (1980-1988). He directed 3 video clips, which were known collectively as War and Martyrs. In 2002 Mirtahmasb began his exploration of the Iranian music industry with his 2004 films Off Beat and Back Vocal. He has also taken part in notable collaborations working as a sound recordist for Mohsen Makhmalbaf, as assistant director alongside Mazieh Meshkini and Samira Makhmalbaf and his collaborative effort with Jafar Panahi This is Not a Film which garnered international acclaim.



Vahid Mobasheri (*Timology*) was born in Shiraz, Iran in 1987 and graduated from the University of Animation of Shiraz. He started work as play-write and assistant director for Iran Radio & TV in 2008, and has produced more than 15 works for TV.



Hawraz Mohammed (Land of the Lost) was born in 1983 in Kurdistan of Iraq, he earned his degree in sociology, and then worked as a filmmaker. Mohammed also has more than 10 years of experience in TV programs and documentaries.



Keivan Mohseni (*Six O'clock*) was born in 1988 in Gerash, Iran. He began is career in filmmaking in 2005 with the short documentary "Abed." Ever since, he has made short films and documentaries, mostly experimental and his films have screened in international festivals. He has also worked in the fields of cinematography and editing

On the 25th of November in 2014 she launched a campaign film for United Nations Association of Sweden to raise awareness of the International Day for Elimination of Violence against women. She did that while she was the Millennium Development Goals Ambassador for the United Nations Association of Sweden. The campaign went viral in Sweden, and when she represented Sweden at the One Young World Summit, the world youth leaders and founders of the organisation were so affected by the campaign, it went international. She currently works with unaccompanied refugee minors and also within the women's refugee.
